

# THE BOEING COMMUNITY INVESTMENT FUND (“BCIF”)

## PROTOCOL

April 20, 2020

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### I. Purpose

The Boeing Company (“Boeing”) established the \$50 million Boeing Community Investment Fund (“BCIF”) to provide philanthropic support to those local communities affected by the Lion Air Flight 610 and Ethiopian Air Flight 302 accidents (collectively, “the Accidents”). Boeing has retained Kenneth R. Feinberg and Camille S. Biros (the “Administrators”) to design, implement and administer the Final Protocol and procedures for the submission, evaluation, allocation and distribution of the BCIF. BCIF’s focus will be on working closely with individual Families who lost loved ones in the Accidents to determine their preferences in distributing the funds.

Boeing has delegated independent authority to the Administrators to select individual programs, projects or charities (the “Programs”) to be funded, while ensuring that the funds are appropriately protected from arbitrary diversion or other improper uses. Administrators are independent contractors fully and solely responsible for their own actions and will not hold themselves out as employees, agents or representatives of Boeing.

At Boeing’s direction, the BCIF is to be administered independent of any litigation or other legal resolution related to the Accidents.

### II. Eligibility for BCIF Funding

To be eligible for BCIF consideration, the Programs requested by Family members must be engaged in providing direct humanitarian support to those local communities affected by the Accidents – such as by providing food, clean water, shelter, clothing, education, and healthcare. “Communities affected” include areas in and around the locations of the two Accidents, and those local communities where those lost in the Accidents lived and worked. Eligibility may also include international organizations engaged in such humanitarian support, which organizations were encouraged and supported by loved ones lost in the Accidents. All Family members and representatives are invited to submit a Family Application Form indicating their preference, if known, for a Program that meets the eligibility requirements described above. (Family Application Form attached as Exhibit A.)

All funds distributed by the BCIF must be used exclusively to fund specific Programs that address these categories of direct-service humanitarian aid to impacted communities. Funds from the BCIF cannot be used to pay salaries or other organizational costs. Nor can the BCIF allocate funds for purposes of lobbying or political or issue advocacy.

Programs recommended by the Families will be sent a Program Application Form by the Administrators. To be eligible to receive financial support from the BCIF, all Program Applications Forms must provide the Administrators sufficient evidence to assure that compliance with the minimum requirements for BCIF financial support, outlined in Section V. Compliance Review of this Final Protocol, will be satisfied. All Programs seeking to receive BCIF funding will be required to complete the Program Application Form and agree in writing that

the Application Form submitted to the Administrators will comply with this Final Protocol and its terms and conditions. The Administrators will make Programs aware of BCIF funding and eligibility criteria on a rolling basis as they are identified by the Families.

### **III. Allocation Process**

After outreach and input from all interested BCIF parties – individual Family members, Family associations, affected communities, government entities, community leaders, lawyers representing Families and all other interested parties – the Administrators will review and evaluate each recommended Program for compliance with the Program’s requirements. Based upon the results of this evaluation and review, the Administrators will establish the final list of Programs from these recommendations for BCIF funding support in a manner that will, in their best judgment, honor the Families’ loss. Families will be afforded the opportunity to associate the name of a lost loved one with a particular BCIF-funded Program.

No financial support paid by the BCIF will reference the Boeing name.

### **IV. Timeline**

**April 20, 2020:** The effective commencement date of the BCIF shall be April 20, 2020. The Program will end on January 15, 2021, with all \$50 million of BCIF funds being distributed. The Protocol will be posted on the BCIF website at [BoeingCommunityInvestmentFund.com](http://BoeingCommunityInvestmentFund.com). The Family Application Form will be available for download from this website. In addition, copies of the Final Protocol and the Family Application Form will be mailed to each Family or the Family’s attorney or representative. The Administrators will make the Program Application Form available to those Programs identified by the Families.

**July 31, 2020:** Deadline for submission of all completed Family Applications to be considered for Administrator review for BCIF funding eligibility.

**September 30, 2020:** Deadline for submission of all completed Program Applications to be considered for eligibility for BCIF funding.

**November 1, 2020:** The Administrators complete the evaluation and compliance review of all BCIF Applications on a rolling basis as they are received and post the final list of approved Programs on the BCIF website available for review by all Families, Family associations, and other interested parties.

**November 2, 2020 – December 31, 2020:** The period for Families, at their sole option, to identify which of the final approved BCIF Programs they select to honor the name of a lost loved one and the name of the Family. Families may choose not to participate in this naming process. The selections may be made on-line via the Program website or via paper submission. The Administrators will make periodic distributions from the BCIF to organizations throughout this period. In the event that funds are remaining that have not been earmarked by the Families, all such remaining funds will be distributed among the funds approved by the BCIF Program at the sole discretion of the Administrators.

**January 15, 2021:** Administrators complete all BCIF distributions.

## **V. Compliance Review**

The Administrators will ensure that each Program selected to receive BCIF funds does not violate applicable United States Government sanction lists as set forth by the Department of the United States Treasury Office of Foreign Assets Control.

Before any potential Program receives BCIF funding, the Administrators will ensure that the applicant meets the following compliance criteria as part of the evaluation process:

1. The Program is legally recognized in the country where it is registered or chartered; the applicant shall submit as part of the application process pertinent copies of legal governing documents.
2. The Program includes a formal transparent leadership structure. The applicant shall submit as part of the application process the individual names of those persons serving in a governing capacity.
3. The Program serves a charitable, humanitarian or public purpose, not a commercial or political purpose.
4. The Program is not established by or controlled or affiliated with a government, a government official, or a government official's immediate Family member.
5. The Program submits, as part of the application process, documentation demonstrating that all income received by the Program is being reinvested in those programs and services that further the charitable, humanitarian or public mission of the Program. No BCIF funds shall be used to benefit any private interest, shareholder or individual, either currently or upon dissolution of the Program.
6. All expenses of the Program administration are reasonable and customary.
7. The Program certifies that it will use any funds provided in compliance with the terms of the U.S. Foreign Corrupt Practices Act and all other applicable anti-corruption or anti-bribery law or regulation.

## **VI. Transfer of BCIF Funds**

Before transferring any BCIF funds to an eligible Program, the Administrators will first determine that (i) the funds will not be paid directly or indirectly to any government official, candidate for political office, or political party; (ii) the Program receiving the BCIF funds creates and retains books and records that accurately and fairly reflect the expenditure of BCIF funds; (iii) the Program agrees to retain such books and records for a period of not less than six (6) years from the date of the final BCIF allocation; (iv) the Program will make such books and records available upon the reasonable request of the Administrators; and (v) the Program will prepare and submit a Final Report to the Administrators documenting the distribution of all BCIF funds.





Altogether about 1,300 children and young people are actively benefitting from **Cometa's** educational, training and support programs, which has resulted in 100% graduation rate for **Cometa** students, and 75% find work within 7 months of graduation.

## Happy Hearts Indonesia




**Happy Hearts Indonesia** is a non-profit organization that envisions every child in Indonesia should have access to education by attending safe and earthquake-resistant schools.

It has since evolved to encompass many other learning initiatives: from the installation of water tanks at schools to the issuance of library cards for reading programs and implementation of courses centered on science, technology, engineering, art, and math, **Kenya Connect** aims to harness the benefits of education to drive sustainable development in under-served parts of Kenya.

Since its founding in 2002, **Kenya Connect** has expanded with robust programming to break down barriers to education while providing enrichment and empowerment activities for 17,000 students and 500 teachers at 44 primary and 11 secondary schools in the Mwala subcounty of Machakos. **Kenya Connect** has supported parent workshops on how to support children for educational success. Students at **Kenya Connect** partner schools had the highest KCPE (Kenya Certificate of Primary Education) in 2016, 2017, and 2018.

Founded in 1994, Friends-International is a leading social enterprise saving lives and building futures of the most marginalized children & youth, their families and their communities in Southeast Asia and across the world.

**Teman Baik** provides immediate support to marginalized children and families in Jakarta, Indonesia, with particular regard to increasing economic self-sufficiency. To achieve this, the program supports caregivers and youth to obtain skills and to generate stable income through micro-enterprise development and job placement. This support is linked with comprehensive social work to ensure that young children are supported to go to school. **Teman Baik** also implements ChildSafe Agent training and local campaigning in Jakarta to respond to reports of children in distress.

In 2017 **Teman Baik** protected and empowered over 3,494 marginalized young people and caregivers within Indonesia. Specifically, **Teman Baik** directly protected 514 children; provided social services to 1,410 children, youth and family members; provided access to education to 393 children; arranged skills training and employment opportunities for 44 young people; and supported micro-enterprise and employment for 18 caregivers.

Indonesia has seen widespread development, but with the fourth largest population in the world, there are still many areas with a severe lack of proper health, education and community services. Millions of families continue to live below the poverty line, surviving on less than two dollars a day. **YUM** has worked for more than four decades in this vast archipelago to support communities, to give them hope and a way out of the cycle of poverty.

**YUM's** mission is to work with communities to provide holistic and sustainable support in three service areas: 1) Health through health education, nutrition, clean water, sanitation, and malaria control; 2) Education through vocational training, school sponsorship, community libraries, early childhood learning, and tutoring & remedial education programs; and 3) Community Development through Cipanas YUM Village (community center), organic farming, and sustainable agriculture.

In 2018, **YUM** provided emergency relief for 12,950 victims of the earthquake in Palu and Donggala. The nonprofit sponsored 180 school-aged children and engaged 4,767 people to take part in trainings, sanitation campaigns, and water tower building in Central Kalimantan.
